Disappearing of the Old General Stores

On June 18th the Auction at High Point sold the J. F. Tising's Sons Store and contents which was similar to Cranes General Store here in Williamsburg (built in 1926). The number of Old General Stores like ours are diminishing. The Old General Store use to be the center of the communities around the country.

The Crane's Country Store is still the center of the Williamsburg community. General stores were often used as/for the town meeting hall, where weddings, funerals, church services, and sometimes school was held. The Old general store use to also be where people could pick up their mail, learn any news, get supplies, and rest. The owners often took the role of mayor.

The Crane Family still holds this kind of role in our little town. They are where we go not only for groceries, but for news, local events, visit friends, and just to relax on their front porch.

It's called a sack holder. Used for paper sacks in Old General Stores, it has all of the sack sizes marked on the side of it. Made of wood, fan shaped, and it sits 18 inches tall and 9 inches wide, it has slot-like shelves every 3 inches.

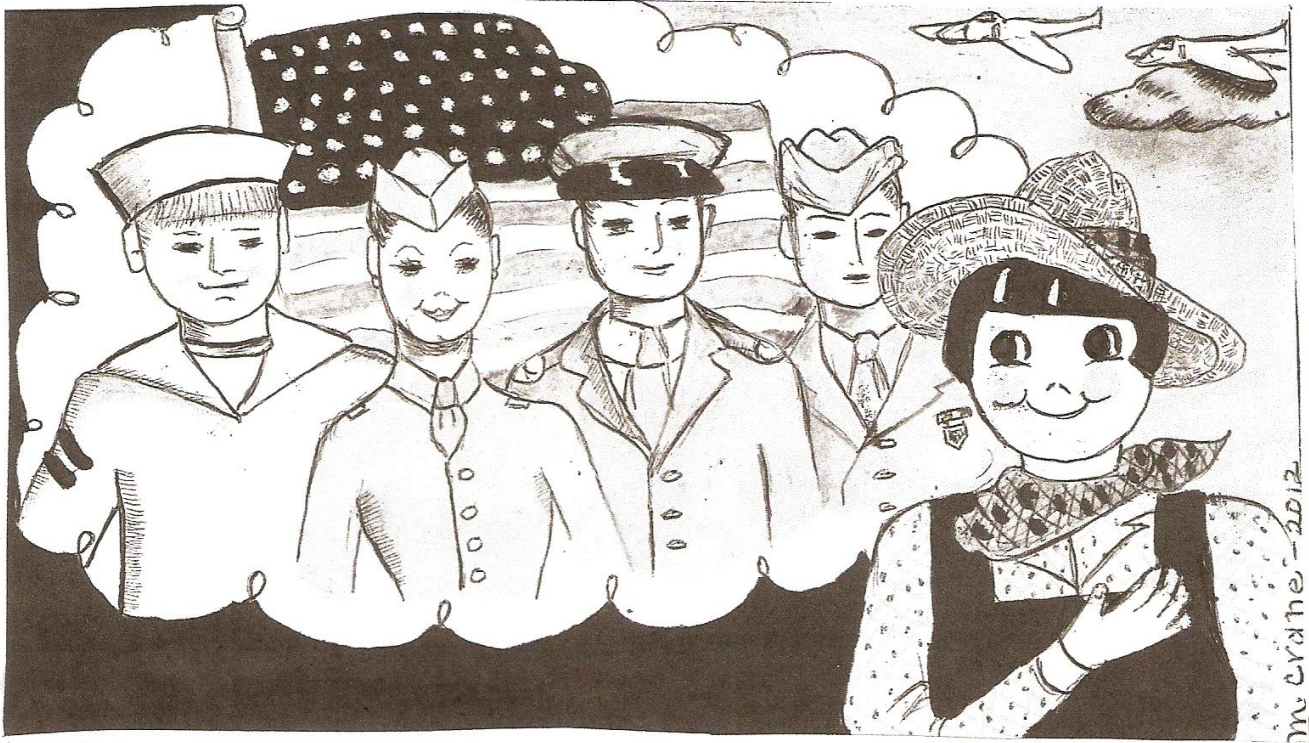
